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What does this animal have?



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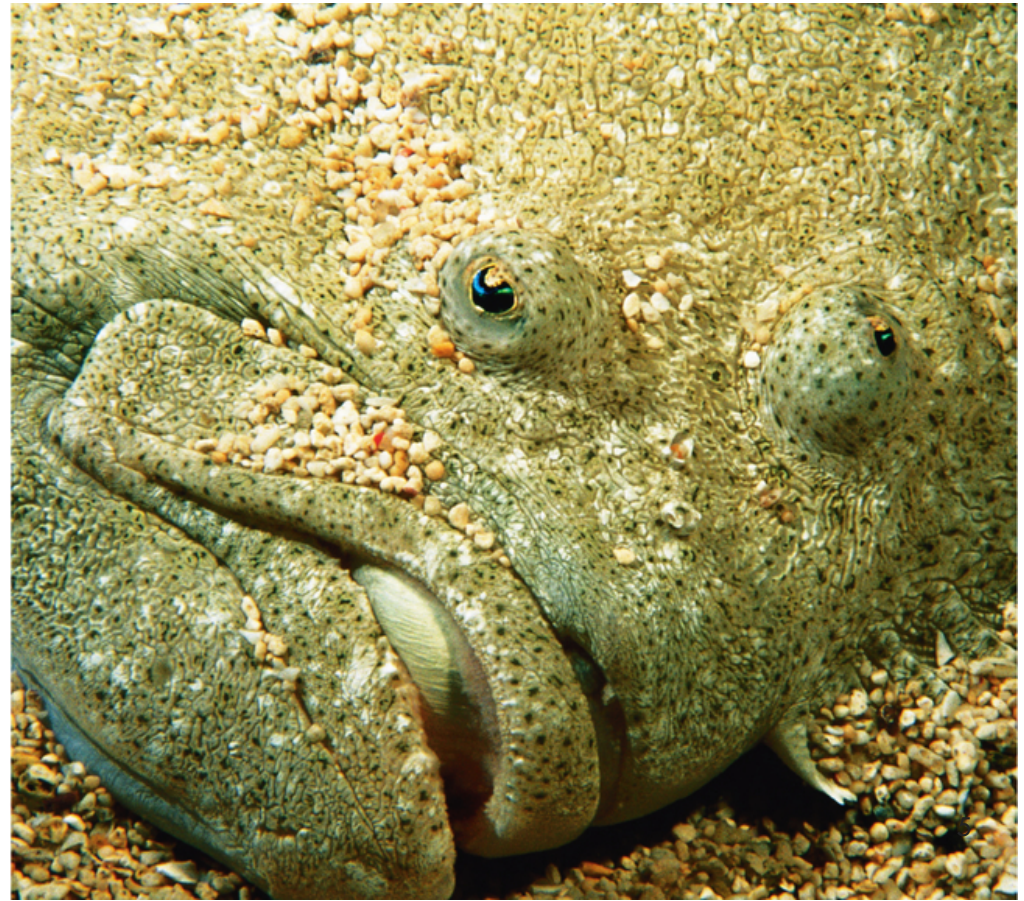
Look at the grasshopper.

It has spots.



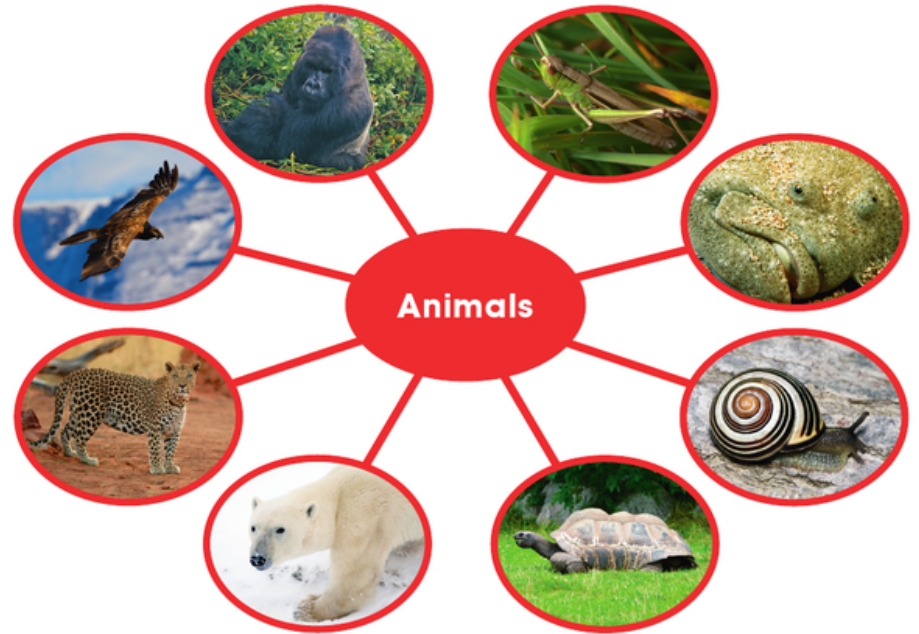
Look at the bird.
