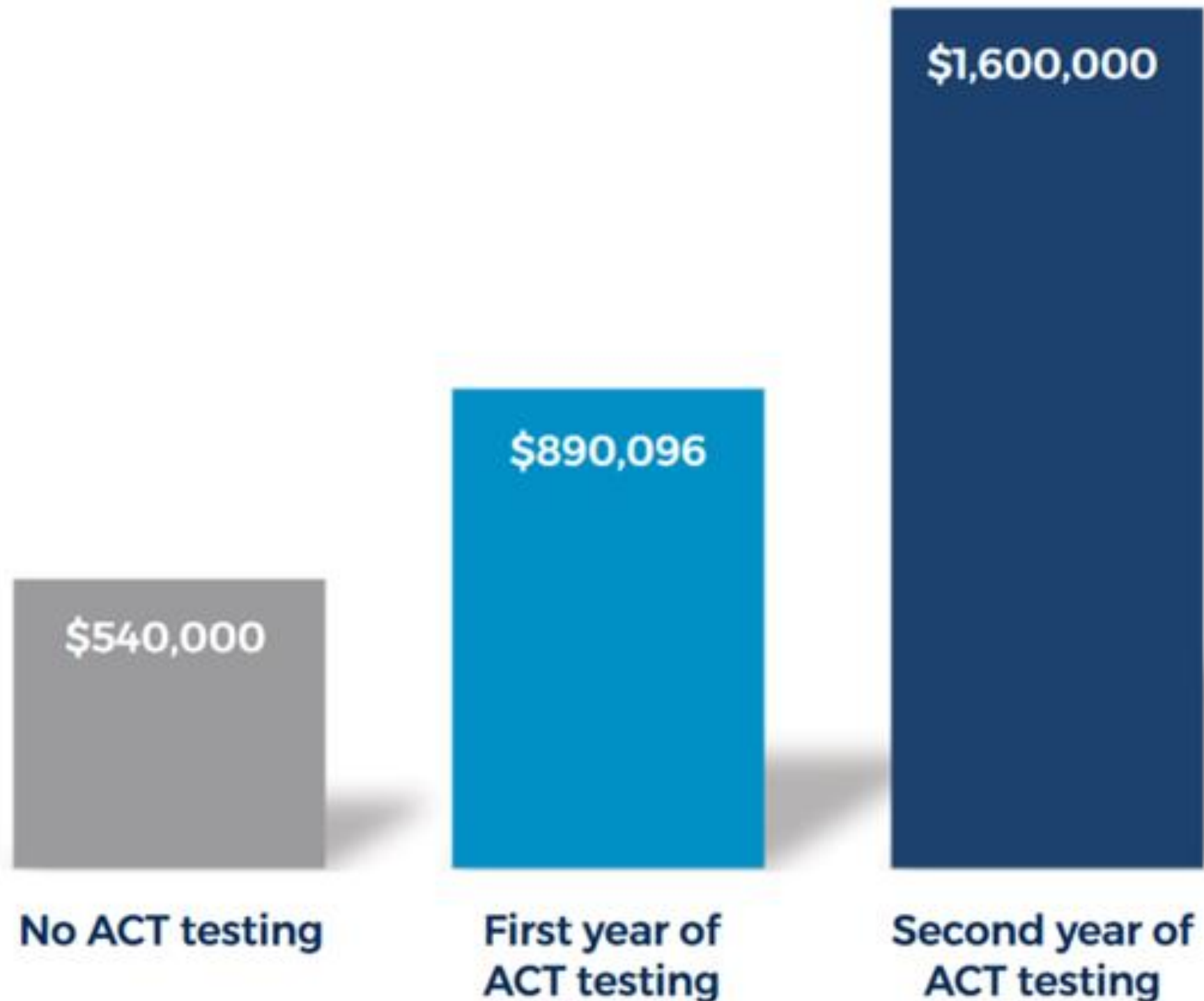

The standardized test used at the school was falling short when it came to supporting 11th graders and did not give the valuable feedback or help with career planning.

By offering the ACT to every student during the school day, the school was promoting equity among students, breaking down barriers, and opening doors for opportunity.

Texas College, Career, and Military Readiness: Increased Rigor

CCMR performance has skyrocketed in Texas, with average performance now at 65 percent. Given these improvements, and the statutory objective of A–F accountability to make Texas a national leader in preparing students for postsecondary success, the cut point for an **A has been adjusted to 88 percent** for high school/K-12 campuses. This raises the bar to begin to meet Texas’s definition of excellence for CCMR.

Inside Higher Ed
Most of America's top private universities - Brown University, Dartmouth College, Harvard, Caltech, Cornell, and Yale University - recently decided to return to requiring standardized tests as part of the admissions process, as did one of our top public institutions, University of Texas at Austin. Massachusetts Institute of Technology made this decision in 2022.

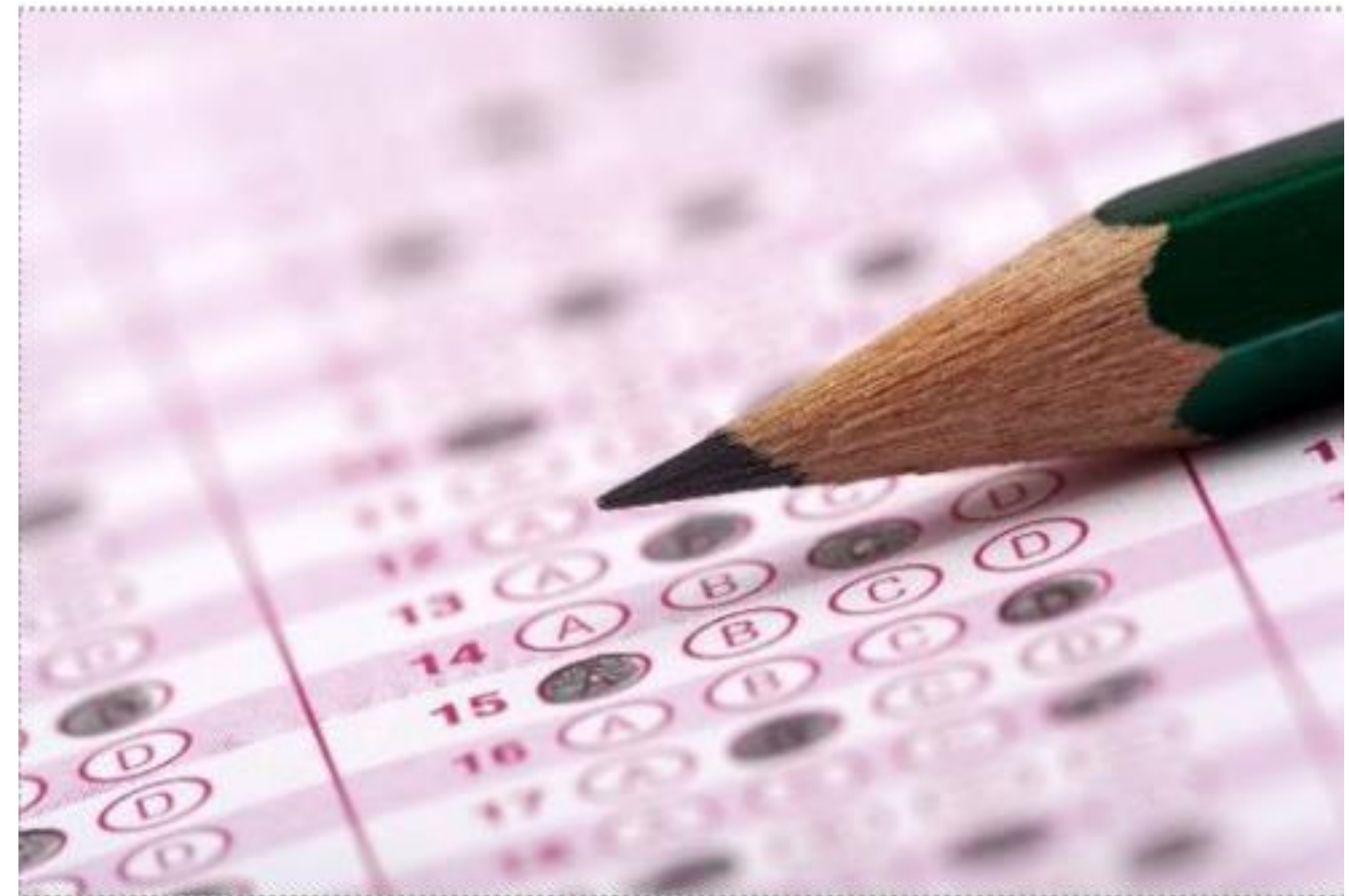

Scores Can Help At Test Optional Schools

- "Many selective colleges are still admitting a larger percentage of students who submit test scores." *
- "Admit rates for students who submit scores also tend to be significantly higher (sometimes by twice as much or more) than for non-submitters at certain colleges." *
- Standardized test scores are often required for scholarship consideration, class placement, and certain programs such as Engineering or Nursing.

ACT is More Than a College Admissions Score



- Is part of a holistic high school course selection (and placement) process.
- Provides valid insights based on content learned at school – identifies strengths and challenges.
- Counters grade subjectivity and inflation.
- Offers a career planning component linked interest, aptitudes, value.
- Impacts course placement or direct admission into certain majors.
- Supports students interested in military testing (ASVAB), which is on par with rigor of ACT.
- Provides standards-based results that are often submitted for math, English, and STEM prerequisites, avoiding additional postsecondary placement testing.
- Gives every student the opportunity to see where they “benchmark.”

Understanding Standards and Benchmark Readiness

College readiness means meeting benchmarks.

- Success in credit-bearing, **first-year courses**.
- Two- or four-year **college, trade school, technical school, or military**.
- **Without needing** to take remedial courses.

Career readiness requires knowledge and skills comparable to those expected of a first-year college student.

- Our goal is to **prepare and educate all students** according to a common academic expectation that prepares them for postsecondary education and the workforce.

Your ranks tell you the approximate percentages of recent high school graduates in the US and your state who took the ACT® test and received scores that are the same as or lower than your scores. For example, a rank of 56 for your Composite score means 56% of students earned that Composite score or below.

Detailed Results



ACT Composite Score: ACT Math, Science, English, and Reading test scores and the Composite score range from 1 to 36. For each test, we converted your number of correct answers into a score within that range. Your Composite score is the average of your scores on the four subjects rounded to the nearest whole number. If you left any test completely blank, that score is reported as two dashes and no Composite score is computed.

ACT Readiness Range: This range shows where a student who has met the ACT College Readiness Benchmark on this subject test would typically perform.



Understanding Complex Texts: This indicator lets you know if you are understanding the central meaning of complex texts at a level that is needed to succeed in college courses with high reading demand.

If you took the writing test, your essay was scored on a scale of 1 to 6 by two raters in each of the four writing domains. These domains represent essential skills and abilities that are necessary to meet the writing demands of college and career. Your domain scores, ranging from 2 to 12, are a sum of the two raters' scores. Your writing score is the average of your four domain scores rounded to the nearest whole number. Sending Your Scores

A score report (including your photo) was automatically sent to the high school you reported when registration was completed for the test. Your school will use this information for counseling, evaluating the effectiveness of instruction, and planning changes and improvements in the curriculum.

At your direction, your scores from this test date are also being reported to the colleges shown. (Be aware that when you send a report to a college that is part of a school system, the college may share your score with other colleges in that system.) Institutions use your test scores along with high school grades, academic preparation, future plans, and other factors to help identify applicants who can benefit most from their programs. In addition, colleges can use results on the ACT to assist scholarship/loan agencies in identifying qualified candidates, place students in first-year courses, and help students develop an appropriate program of study.

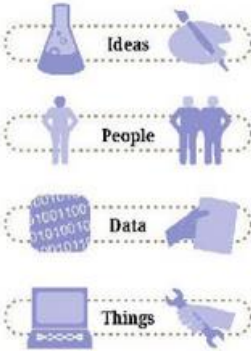

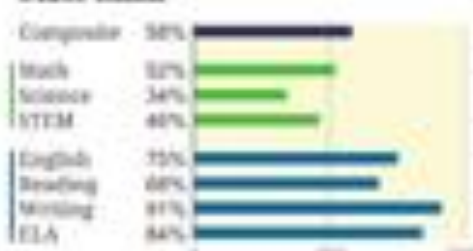

Typical Composite Score on a Retest



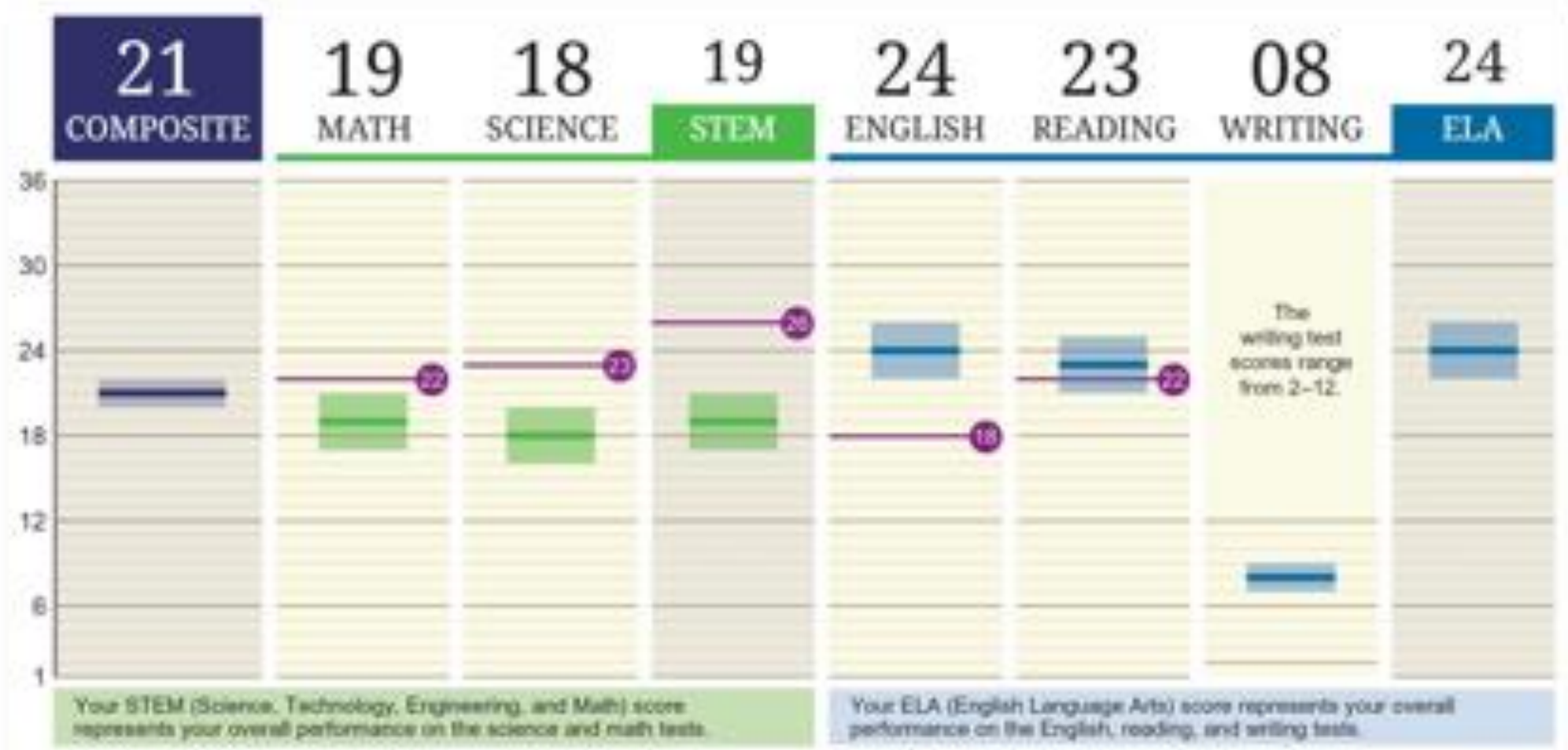

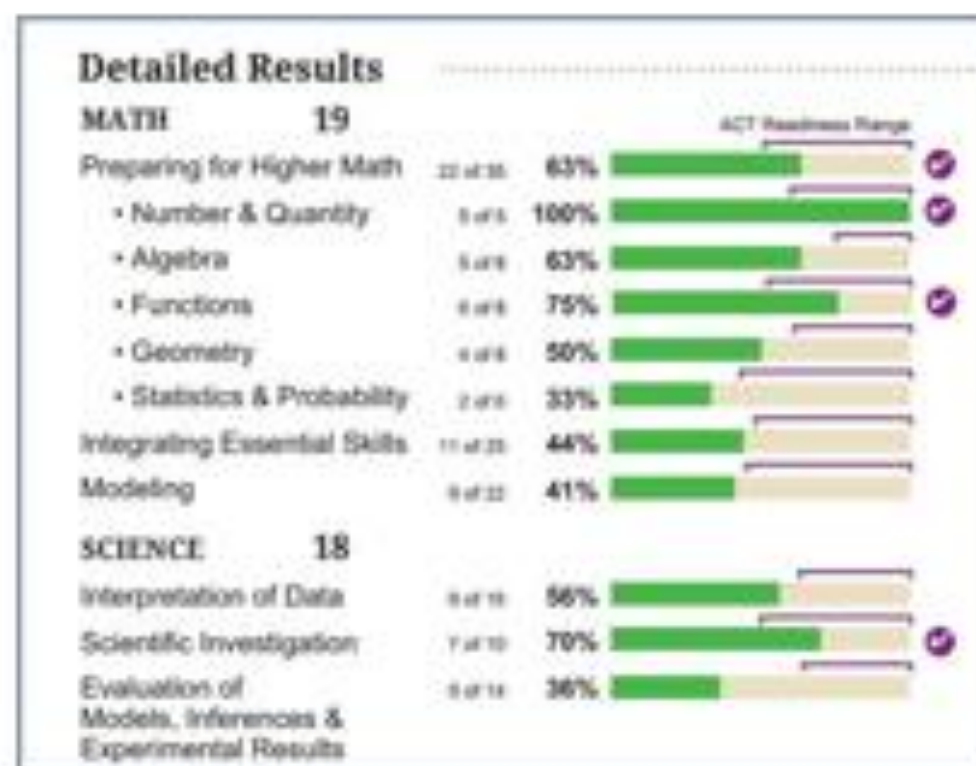

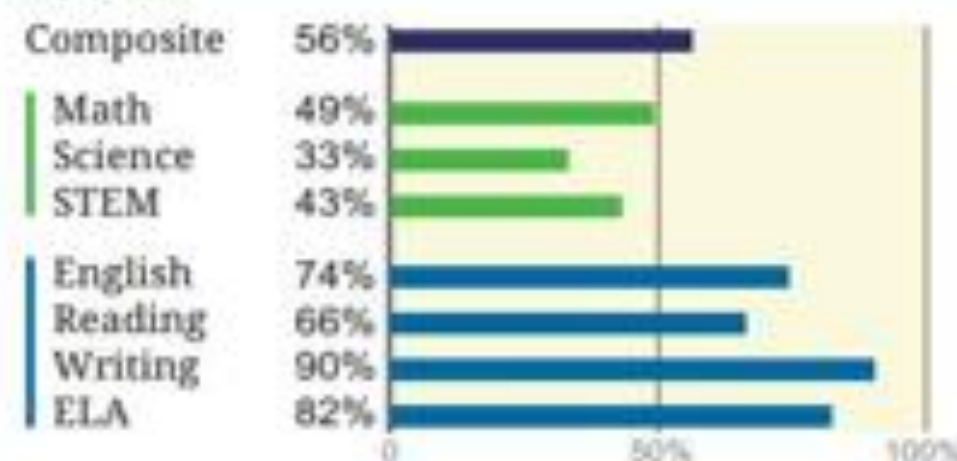

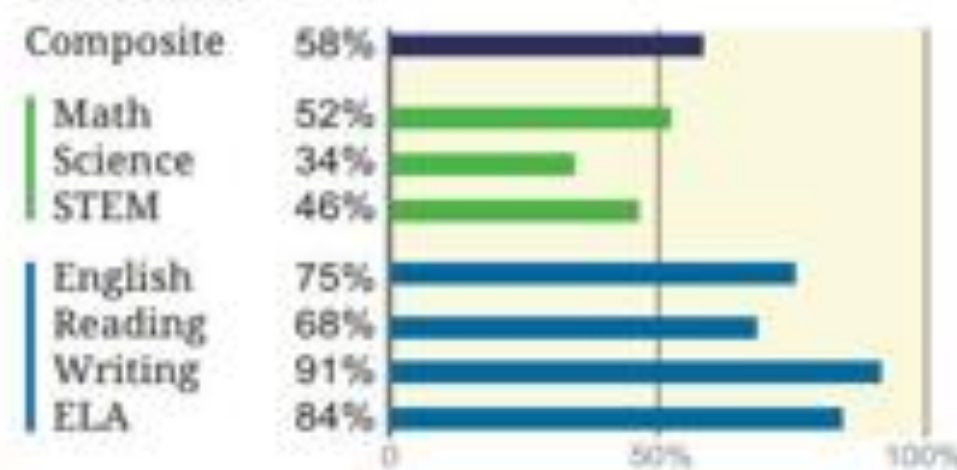

How to receive and use an ACT fee waiver?



1. Check with your school counselor to see if you are eligible to apply.
2. Once your school counselor determines eligibility, you can receive up to four fee waivers to take the ACT test.
3. When you register for the ACT online or by mail, use your ACT fee waiver code.

ACT Fee Waiver Program

- **Covers basic registration fee** on national test taken in junior or senior year
- May be used for 4 **administrations** for the ACT
- Allows students to send **scores to four college choices** when registering for the test
- Allows any number of **free** additional score reports after registration
- Provides results to inform instruction through **online reporting** shortly after tests are scored
- Includes **free access to test prep**
